A Michigan author is traveling to Vicksburg to talk about her book, which has been named one of TIME MAgazine's top 100 young adult books of all time.

Angeline Boulley wrote Firekeeper's Daughter. The book has been selected as the Great Michigan Read title for the fall of 2023 and spring of 2024. The program aims to connect Michigan residents by deepening the reader's understanding of the state, society and humanity.

The book is set in Sault Ste. Marie on an Ojibwe reservation. Boulley is a member of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians. She will be in Vicksburg to speak about her book on Monday, October 23rd. The community event is at 6pm at the Vicksburg High School Performing Arts Center. It's, but registration is requested.

Volunteers from Connections Community Church in Schoolcraft spent time at our Outdoor Education Center at the start of the school year.


They completed multiple projects to help improve the site for our students.

Tennis Green Out Invitational


The Vicksburg High School Boys Tennis Team hosted their Green Out Invitational in support of mental health awareness.


This was the second year for the invitational with a goal of bringing awareness to mental health struggles and the support that is available for both students and community members.
